Introduction

This report provides an overview of the achievements of the FPC Foundation fund for the grants that were awarded from 2020 to 2023.

The aims of the FPC Foundation fund are:

To support projects that are helping people in the most need to manage and improve their finances e.g. money management including benefits maximisation and debt advice. Projects that incorporate an element of mental health and wellbeing support are also welcome.

Overview of Grant-Making


After an initial sift against the fund criteria the FPC Foundation grant applications go through due diligence checking by the Community Foundation to ensure all relevant governance procedures, policies and insurances are in place and to provide information on the applicant's monitoring track record with the Community Foundation. Applications are then forwarded to the donor or their representatives for consideration in line with the criteria of the fund. Recommendations on funding are then made at a Panel Meeting.

Grants Awarded


Over the past three years, the Community Foundation has received 37 applications that were considered by the fund panel, with a total value of funding requested of £68,929. In total, since 2020, the fund has awarded £54,239.50 in grants and donations to 28 community groups and voluntary organisations.

The FPC Foundation Supported Community Projects – Case Studies

Parenting 2000 (£1,430)

About the Group: The charity runs a range of services that provide emotional and practical support to vulnerable children, young people and families from their 2 Centres in Southport and Crosby.

Project Summary: To make and distribute 95 Christmas stockings for children and young people.

About the Project:

'We made up 95 age-appropriate Christmas stockings for children and young people to be distributed directly to them and to families in our community who have suffered hardships due to the COVID pandemic this year. These children and young people attend Alchemy Youth Club and are from some of the most vulnerable families we work with in our Early Help Programme.'

Case Study/Quotes: (beneficiaries)

"Receiving the Christmas dinner and my stocking was a really positive and meaningful experience. I am not sure how I can put into words how much it meant."

"I think that the presents and the whole Christmas session was wonderful, I had the best time eating my roast and I am so glad I got to see my friends and staff before Christmas!"





"The gifts were wonderful and very

surprising also the Christmas dinner was very nice."

"It was so thoughtful, even though I had been only going for a month at this point they got it right down to the things I really like and I constantly use everything."

General Feedback: 'Thank you so much for this grant - you've made a lot of young people very happy.'

Netherton Park Community Association (£1,430)

About the Group: The Association aims to provide community facilities and activities to promote social welfare, education, recreation and leisure within the Netherton Park area.

Project Summary: To support low-income households with energy costs and essentials.

About the Project:

'We sourced a variety of dry and fresh foods and distributed them to targeted families and individuals. We also provided crisis food hampers to people in distress or facing benefit delays. We also sourced and distributed essential hygiene goods for vulnerable families and individuals and emergency prepayment energy cards.'

Case Study/Quotes: (beneficiary). 'RW, 28, who has autism, lives in a communal block of six flats and



requires support with his health, finances and general wellbeing. We have connected him with a health mentor, arranged for him to receive PIP and, through calling on him weekly with food and cleaning products as well as introducing him to a community connector, we have helped to improve his living conditions and enhanced his confidence, which has made a vast difference to his life.'

General Feedback: 'The grant brought smiles and reassurance to so many people over the festive season. You would have thought they had won the lottery when presented with the hampers at the door.'

Paper Cup Project (£1,430)

About the Group: The Liverpool based charity supports rough sleepers and people who are or are at risk of becoming homeless with essentials, advice and signposting to services that can ultimately provide a way out of homelessness.

Project Summary: To provide Christmas wellbeing packs to vulnerable people who are homeless.



About the Project: 'We worked with 2 schools to provide Christmas packs for people experiencing homelessness or tackling addiction who were temporarily housed over the Christmas period. We worked with 3 groups of young people who made Christmas cards to go inside the packs. This was a way to educate young people about homelessness and loneliness at Christmas as well as sharing their lovely positive messages. We then purchased gifts to fill 130 bags and the bags were filled by some of our volunteers and distributed across the city before Christmas Eve.'


Case Study/Quotes:
