# Campaign overview

DHSC first launched the national adult social care workforce campaign in 2019, with the aim of driving people with the right values to apply for and fill paid vacancies in the adult social care sector.

The campaign uses high profile advertising across a range of channels to raise awareness of vacancies in adult social care and reframe perceptions of a job in the sector.

As one of the largest sectors in England, and one that continues to grow, there are vacancies available in every part of the country offering long-term employment prospects and the opportunity for promotion and progression.

It's a rewarding career that can enable those transitioning out of the Armed Services and veterans to use the skillset they've built up during their time in the Armed Forces to keep making a difference to their community and to people's lives. It also offers a great opportunity for the families of those in the Armed Forces, offering work-life balance and a broad spread of roles.

No formal qualifications are needed to start working in adult social care – it's more about having the right qualities. Those that like supporting people, have good communication and problem-solving skills and enjoy working as part of a team would probably make great care workers.

Adult social care employers know that Service leavers and their families can bring a huge amount to any role and are keen to utilise the skills and experience that they can bring.

# Information about the sector



# What is adult social care?

## Adult social care is the support provided to help people who are older or living with disability or physical or mental illness to live independently and stay well and safe.

It is a crucial service which provides the support which enables people to live more independently and have a better quality of life.

With around 1.6 million people working in adult social care, it is one of the largest sectors in England. What's more it continues to grow, meaning there are lots of opportunities available in every part of the country offering long-term employment prospects and the opportunity for promotion and progression.

The sector is made up of a mixture of around 18,000 different employers, including private companies, charities, local authorities and even the NHS.

There are a huge range of different settings people could choose to work in within adult social care. It just depends what they're interested in, who they want to work with and where they want to work. They could provide support for someone who is living at home and in their community, work in a residential care home, or even invite someone to live with them in their own home as part of a Shared Lives Scheme.



## Within adult social care there's an amazing variety of different roles available and the work is incredibly varied.

Whether people are enabling adults with learning disabilities to live more independently or supporting people with dementia, they'll have the chance to make a difference to people's lives every day.

There are lots of entry-level adult social care jobs, including care home roles and live-in roles. All offer on-the-job training to help people develop skills and confidence whilst working.

Here are some of the more common roles which are available:

- Activity support worker Key tasks include organising social activities for people who need care and support.
- Care worker Help people with all aspects of their daily lives.
- **Personal care assistant** Someone who is directly employed by an individual person, supporting them to live independently, usually in their own home.
- **Rehabilitation support worker** Helping people live independently, often following an illness.
- Shared Lives carer Shared Lives carers open their home to someone who needs help.

To land a first job in adult social care, all people need are the right qualities, rather than specific qualifications. With on-the-job training and ongoing support, starting a career in care has never been easier.

# Eligibility

Application criteria will vary between different job roles and each organisation will have their own distinct recruitment and employment policies. However, these are some of the checks which organisations will need to carry out:

- **Identity check** individuals will be asked to supply documentation proving their identity during recruitment and prior to commencing employment.
- **Employment history and references check** references will be crosschecked before an unconditional offer of employment is made in order to verify their employment history.
- **Background check** individuals will need to undergo an advanced DBS (Disclose and Barring Service) check which will reveal any criminal convictions, warnings, cautions or reprimands.
- **Right to work in the UK check** employers are required by law to check an individual's right to work in the UK. They will be asked to declare their right to work in the UK during recruitment, and this right will need to be evidenced before employment can commence.
